### FROM THE PAST PRESIDENT

Springtime brings us Pesach and our greatest pronouncement of freedom from slavery as we emerge from the tyranny of the Pharaohs and head toward our destiny: to receive the Torah at Mount Sinai and become G-d's miracle, the Jewish people.

On the calendar, we approach Pesach from the lingering sweetness of hamantaschen and Purim joy, having escaped the planned annihilation by the evil Haman. Yet Passover is when and where it all begins for us as a people.

Our gratitude to Hashem is expressed in the reading and singing of the Haggadah. In return we are asked to retell the story of Passover to our children, the next generation, and the next generation, and so on. The Haggadah has in it a Teacher's Guide, that helps us explain and reach all our children. The Haggadah profiles four sons of different personalities. They are Chacham—the wise son; Rasha—the evil or rebellious son; Tam—the simple son; and last we meet—Eino yode'a lish'ol—the son who doesn't know how to ask. It is truly amazing that year in and year out we do not waiver and we do not leave anything out at the Seder, our storytelling is consistent and a constant. From this, holding the Seder, reading the Haggadah, we are re-visiting, re-living the origin of our destiny. I believe our parents and grandparents showed us that we, and every generation, are now and forever a link in the chain. Pesach binds us to our Jewish heritage and teaches us not to forget where we came from and where we are headed. As a people, our destiny comes with perpetuating Jewish thought and beliefs into the future one Pesach at a time.

To me that is why we read the Haggadah and tell the Passover story to our children at the Seder table. We learn each year that it is increasingly important not to fail in our obligation to our children and our children's children. That's when we can say Dayenu.

#### BE SURE TO MAKE AN ERUV TAVSHILIN FOR THE SECOND DAY OF PASSOVER WHICH FALLS ON SHABBOS

This year, the last days of Yom Tov fall on Friday and Saturday, April 26 & 27. Saturday, April 27 is Shabbos. Since we do not cook on Yom Tov for the next day of Shabbos and we cannot prepare meals on the Shabbos, we must make an *Eruv Tavshilin*. To do this, we set aside two cooked items on Erev Yom Tov (Thursday, April 25) usually a hard boiled egg and a board of matza, and make the following declaration:

Blessed art thou, L-rd our G-d, King of the Universe, who hast sanctified us with thy commandments, and commanded us concerning the observance of the *Eruv*.

By means of this *Eruv*, may we be permitted to bake, cook, keep dishes warm, light Sabbath lights, and prepare during the festival all we need for the Sabbath - we and all Israelites that live in this town.

(Through this procedure, the preparation for the Shabbos meals has begun technically before the Yom Tov, thus making it permissible to continue the preparation on the following days as well.)

#### **CONGREGATION ETZ CHAYIM CONSTITUTION UPDATE**



The current constitution of Congregation Etz Chayim was approved by the Board in 1999 with a couple of amendments approved in the past several years. As a result, President Bob Berkowitz created a Constitution Committee consisting of Steve Marcus, Charles Wittenberg, Naomi Baron, and himself in order to review the current constitution and bring it up-to-date to reflect changes in our synagogue during the past 20 years. The current constitution requires that any changes or amendments to the constitution must be approved by a specific process.

The constitution states: "This Constitution shall be subject to changes or amendments provided the same shall have been submitted in writing to the Board. Such proposed Amendments shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the Synagogue for at least fifteen (15) days and published in the Hashomer at least thirty (30) days prior to a vote. Any amendment shall be adopted and in full force and effect upon approval of two-thirds of the Board of Trustees in attendance at a regular or special meeting of the Board of Trustees."

An extensive review of the changes to the constitution was presented at the last Board meeting on Feb. 24 of this year. Notice of the changes has been posted on the bulletin board in Etz Chayim. The proposed constitution will be voted on by the Board at the Thursday, May 23 Board meeting.

Hans Kràsa's children's opera, "Brundibar", a simple story of the struggle against evil, was performed more than 50 times between 1943 and 1944 by Jewish children in the Theresienstadt ghetto. In this documentary a Berlin-based youth theatre group stages the opera. The members of the group are young people from different ethnic backgrounds who live on the fringes of society. The group is accompanied by Greta Klingsberg, a charismatic elderly woman from Israel and one of the few survivors of the original cast of "Brundibar". Greta travels back to Theresienstadt with the young actors to show them how and where the piece was originally staged. A continental breakfast will be served.

SUNDAY, APRIL 14 at 11:00 a.m. - Religious School Model Seder in the Etz Chayim Social Hall. All parents and children are invited.

SUNDAY, APRIL 28 at **2:00 p.m.** - Art Museum Tour of the museum's current exhibit *Different Trains* with our favorite TMA docent, Andrea Delman. The cost is \$8.00 per person. *Different Trains* is a profoundly moving work. A large-scale video installation that spans more than 20 feet and is 29 minutes in duration, the work features a 1988 musical score by Steve Reich, reinterpreted by Spanish filmmaker Beatriz Caravaggio. Steve Reich's 1988 score for string quartet and recorded voice is a beautiful and emotionally charged rumination on the train journeys of his youth and of the horrific deportation trains of the Holocaust. The score was awarded the 1989 Grammy for the Best Contemporary Classical Composition.

#### **IMPORTANT PASSOVER INFORMATION**

Below is some information regarding dates and times and rules for Passover. Please note that on Shabbos Hagadol, there will be a special sermon given during the morning service. Times for this service are listed below.

Rabbi Rubin welcomes any questions you might have in regard to the Passover holiday. He is available at the synagogue office, by email at ebrubin@me.com or on his cell phone, 419-290-7315.

#### Shabbos Hagadol Drasha

The Shabbos preceding Passover is traditionally referred to as "Shabbos HaGadol," literally, "The Great Sabbath." On this special Shabbos, it is customary for the Rabbi's drasha to focus on a topic related to Passover, thus serving as a preparation for the upcoming holiday. This year's lecture is titled, "The Communal Nature of Passover." Be sure to join us on April 13 for this fascinating and inspiring presentation. Shacharit will begin at 9:00 AM. A delicious luncheon will follow.

**Ma'os Chitim**: Because of the great expense in purchasing the wine, matzah, and kosher for Passover food necessary for a proper observance of the holiday, charity is collected in the weeks prior to Pesach for the specific purpose of helping those who have a difficult time meeting these expenses. This campaign is traditionally referred to as "Ma'os Chitim," literally, "Money for Wheat," referring to the high cost involved in properly tending to the wheat so that it may be turned into matzah. Rabbi Rubin will be collecting money to be distributed to those in need. Please make checks payable to "Congregation Etz Chayim," and include "Rabbi's Discretionary Fund" in the memo. If you are in need of financial assistance in properly preparing for the holiday, please contact Rabbi Rubin.

**Prohibition of Chametz**: Chametz is defined as any product made of the five grains—wheat, barley, oats, spelt, and rye—which has been given an opportunity to leaven. In addition to the prohibition against eating these foods, the Torah forbids even owning such products on Pesach. To ensure that no chametz be in our possession during the entire duration of the holiday, a number of practices are put into place: Bedikas Chametz, Bitul Chametz, and Mechiras Chametz (see below). As a practical matter, only items that bear proper "Kosher for Passover" certification should be eaten on Passover. Due to the complexities of industrial food production, items cannot be deemed kosher for Passover simply by analyzing the printed ingredients.

**Prohibition of Kitniyos**: The long-standing tradition amongst Ashkenazic Jews has been to refrain from eating "kitniyos" on Pesach. Though literally translated as "legumes," in the context of Pesach, the term includes a litany of other items that could be confused for genuine grains. Examples include corn, peanuts, beans, peas, mustard seed, and soy, as well as any of their derivatives, such as corn syrup, peanut butter, and tofu. As mentioned in regards to chametz, only foods that bear proper "Kosher for Passover" certification should be utilized during the holiday. For questions regarding fresh produce, please contact Rabbi Rubin.

**Bedikas Chametz**: In order to ensure that chametz has been completely eradicated from our homes prior to the onset of Pesach, the Sages enacted the practice of "Bedikas Chametz," or "Searching for Chametz," to be done after nightfall on the eve of Pesach. The Sages called for this to be done specifically at night because of the ability to detect smaller crumbs in the nooks and crannies of the home by candlelight at night than by sunlight during the day. Any areas of the home which cannot be safely checked by candlelight should be examined with a flashlight. Bedikas Chametz should be performed this year on Thursday night, April 18, after 9:01 PM. Following Bedikas Chametz, the appropriate Nullification of Chametz should be recited (see Bitul Chametz, below)

**Bitul Chametz**: As a safety measure to ensure that no chametz is left in our possession over Pesach, "Bitul Chametz," or, "The Nullification of Chametz" is performed. This is a verbal declaration whereby the owner removes all ownership over any chametz that may still be left in his possession. This declaration is made twice, each with a slightly variant text from the other. The first declaration is made following Bedikas Chametz (see above) on the night before Pesach. In this declaration, we nullify all that we have not found and are unaware of, but retain ownership over chametz which we are aware of. This exclusion is made so as to still retain ownership over the chametz which we will burn the following morning at Bi'ur Chametz (see below). The second declaration is made following the burning of the chametz on the morning before Passover. In this declaration, we remove ownership from any and all chametz which may still be in our possession. The text for each declaration can be found in any standard Haggadah. Because this is a legal declaration, it is imperative that the meaning of the declaration be understood in its entirety. As such, the declaration should be recited in English, and may then be repeated in the original Aramaic if desired.

**Bi'ur Chametz**: Literally, "The Destruction of the Chametz." Destroying chametz is an independent mitzvah commanded by the Torah, apart from the overarching need to rid one's home of chametz. This mitzvah can only be performed with chametz that we still own. It is for this reason that the Nullification of Chametz recited the night before, following our search for the chametz was limited only to that chametz which went unfound and of which we were unaware. We make a point of retaining ownership over the chametz which we are aware of so that we will be able to actively destroy it the next morning, in fulfillment of this Biblical mitzvah. We make a point of burning the chametz, as opposed to destroying it through some other means, in order to fulfill the mitzvah according to R' Yehudah, whose opinion as stated in the Mishnah is that burning the chametz is the only manner in which this mitzvah may be fulfilled. The chametz should be burned before 10:00 AM and no chametz should be eaten afterward until the closing of Pesach.

<u>Mechiras Chametz</u>: Chametz that the owner does not wish to destroy before Pesach may be sold to a gentile. To effect this sale, the rabbi is given "power of attorney" over a person's chametz and then sells it to a gentile on the owner's behalf on the morning before Pesach. Rabbi Rubin will be available following morning and evening services and by appointment until the morning of Erev Pesach, Friday, April 19 to be appointed as an agent to sell your chametz on your behalf.

PLEASE NOTE: The sale of the chametz is a binding legal transaction. The utilization of this chametz while it still belongs to the gentile is an act of theft. Please take care to leave the chametz aside until 9:45 PM on Saturday night, April 27, at which point the rabbi will have re-purchased the chametz for all its original owners.

#### Start of the Seder

One may not fulfill any of the mitzvot related to the Seder until Pesach actually begins, at nightfall on the 15<sup>th</sup> of Nissan. This coincides with 9:03 PM on the night of the first Seder, Friday, April 19, and 9:04 PM on the night of the second Seder, Saturday, April 20. Great care should be taken to recite the Kiddush and begin the Seder only after this time. With the understanding that such a late start time makes it difficult to enjoy a protracted Seder, below are some suggestions to streamline the Seder and keep it from becoming unnecessarily drawn out.

- Station Matzah, Marror, and other Seder Plate items throughout the table. Participants can take for themselves rather than the Seder Leader passing the portions all around the table.
- Remember that analyzing and conversing about the Haggadah can continue to take place even after it has been read and everyone is enjoying dinner. Consider streamlining things by capping the number of thoughts that each participant may share while the Haggadah is read and waiting until dinner to continue the conversation.
- If younger children are the motivation to start the Seder early, consider a pre-Seder Seder for them. Sit down with them before the Seder officially begins, have them eat dinner, hear the thoughts and songs they've learned at religious school and want to share with their family. They can fall asleep even before the Seder begins, having already been given important holiday memories.



### Multimedia masterpiece *Different Trains* at the Toledo Museum of Art

An important reminder of one of the greatest tragedies in human history, *Different Trains*, a large-scale video installation spanning nearly 25 feet, is in the Toledo Museum of Art's Canaday Galley until May 5, 2019.

The profoundly moving work about the Holocaust is both historically important and aesthetically impressive. The 29-minute film runs on a continuous loop and features the 1988 musical score by American composter Steve Reich, recorded by the Kronos Quartet and visually reinterpreted by Spanish filmmaker Beatriz Caravaggio.

Reich's 1988 score is a beautiful and emotionally charged rumination on the train journeys of his youth and of the horrific deportation trains of the Holocaust. The work was awarded the 1989 Grammy for the Best Contemporary Classical Composition.

Created by Caravaggio in 2016, *Different Trains* sets Reich's score to an archival film montage that lends new depths and insights to the original musical composition. Both the music and videos are beautifully composed; Reich's score is fragmented and modern, while Caravaggio's editing swiftly leads the audience through the work.


