A MESSAGE FROM RABBI JASON MARK

(This drasha was delivered by Rabbi Mark while in Toledo on Shabbos, August, 9.)

Many of you remember the disappointment three years ago when Ariel and I matched in West Virginia and the whirlwind of shock that came with it. We as a community experienced the grief of that moment together, the pain of not getting something that we all wanted so deeply. Disappointment can be crushing. When we've wanted something for a long time, it can be hard to shift our focus and see anything other than that which did not happen.

Disappointment comes in many shapes and sizes. It does not just present around acute, significant life events, like we experienced. Small regrets can accumulate, snowballing into an overwhelming sense of mourning for the life one expected, but did not receive. In my work, I regularly encounter people who struggle to see past all the things they "should have" and all the things they "could've been". It's necessary to grieve, to feel the pain of not getting what we want. And yet it is all too easy to become trapped in staying in the mindset of loss. In doing so, they fail to notice the fuller picture of their lives, which, while it may include pain and disappointment, also holds blessings and beauty.

Moshe's denial from entering the land of Israel is perhaps one of the more heartbreaking moments of Tanach. It feels unfair that this leader, who gave so much of his life to his people and to GD, is denied the climactic experience of joining his people in their ultimate destination. And it is a disappointment that Moses seems unable to move beyond, he stays stuck in bitterness and grief. He pleads to GD, begs GD to let him enter the land, and blames the Israelites for his denial several times throughout our Parsha.

Unfortunately, we do not see Moshe move towards acceptance around this sense of loss in his life. And yet, I do think that Moshe's inability to enter into the land changed him in significant ways. As Moses faces the reality that his life is ending and that he will not be the leader to guide his people to the land, his focus shifts. He turns to reflect on his legacy, the core message he wants to leave behind for the people.

And so the man who once described himself as "not a man of words," crafts the complete book of Devarim as a farewell speech. And in it, he offers us some of Judaism's most essential teachings: the Shema prayer alongside many critical passages that line our siddur, calls to love one another and uphold justice, and words of caution to guide generations to come. I wonder if Moshe had been allowed to enter the land, would we have merited these same teachings? Would he have felt that same pressure to distill the core of his life's teachings to the people in a way he had never done before? Moses' disappointment was good. It created something new and beautiful.

If we are open to seeing new possibilities, life's disappointments can offer us profound learning experiences. These moments can shift our perspectives, toward the blessings that we do have and allow us to appreciate all the joys of where we are now. Blessings that we might have noticed had we been exclusively focused on our hopes and wishes. Amidst my disappointment with the match, I was blessed with a community that, even in that moment of despair, inspired me to see the potential good in the unexpected twist in the road that life had given me and view it as a blessing.

The Baal Shem Tov, the founder of Hasidut, taught a similar message, which I think of often, living in West Virginia. He argues that many of us have an over-idealized image of what religious or spiritual lives should look like. This, he argues, does not ultimately serve GD. We sometimes find ourselves in situations where we are unable to pray or engage in Torah in the way that we would like. The Baal Shem Tov teaches that rather than being upset at ourselves and our circumstances, we should shift our perspective and understand that GD values all forms of service and worship.

Sometimes we find ourselves in West Virginia, or without a minyan, or a community. The Baal Shem Tov invites us to think that we are placed in that "unideal" situation to do the spiritual work that GD needs of us in this world. What is demanded of us therefore is flexibility to understand that the mission of our lives looks different in every moment. That what we have to offer the world might look different from the way we've imagined it.

We are not sole authors of our lives. As much as we try to plan and carve out our destinies, each of us as individuals and as collectives is guided by forces much bigger than ourselves. And so when we find ourselves disappointed, be it as individuals or as communities, I invite us to consider the V GD's eye view. That even if we cannot see the why or the how, the places and situations that we find ourselves are precisely where we needed in ways we might not even imagine. And like for Moshe, something new and beautiful might emerge from that place.

I invite us to turn our attention to the Here and now. May we merit to see and live into the unique blessings and opportunities that this moment, with all of its rough edges and messiness offers us. Shabbat Shalom.

GIFT SHOP NEWS


